Flash Drafting an Argument Using an Organizational Structure

Argument Essays begin with a Position Statement (thesis, claim), which is where the author states his/her opinion on the topic. A position statement often goes like this:
I think because (reason 1), because
(reason 2), and because (reason 3).
The position statement is followed by the Body Paragraphs , which is where the author supports his/her position with reasons and evidence. Body paragraphs often go like this:
(Reason 1) One reason (position statement) is that • For example, (evidence a) • Also, (evidence b) • In addition, (evidence c)
(Reason 2) Another reason (position statement) is that • For example, (evidence a) • Also, (evidence b) • In addition, (evidence c)
(Reason 3) Another reason (position statement) is that • For example, (evidence a) • Also, (evidence b) • In addition, (evidence c)
Argument Essays finish with a Concluding Statement , which is where the author summarizes the most important points made. A concluding statement often goes like this:
(reason 1), (reason 2), and (reason 3), therefore it is my belief that
